
What exactly is a mealworm?

Mealworms are the larvae of the *Tenebrio molitor* beetle (a darkling beetle). They are high in protein, fat, and fiber. Mealworms are especially attractive to nesting birds to feed to their young.

You can put out live or freeze-dried mealworms for your birds. Or you can offer any of the WBU products that contain mealworms

And are you putting out these for the birds to get extra protein?



Birds Love Insects


You may enjoy watching birds eat the food you put out in your feeders, but many of those same birds really love insects, especially during nesting season! The following birds (plus many others)

would love for you to put out mealworms. Can you recognize these? Feel free to color them!

Male cardinals are red with a black mask on their face and a crest on its head. Females look the same except that they are brownish.

They make well-hidden nests in dense shrubs, vines, or low trees.

Male bluebirds have blue back, orange throat and breast and a white belly. Females are grayish with orange and white. They are cavity nesters, which means they like to build their nests inside a hollow area, like a bird house at least 5 feet off the ground in an open area.




Wrens are brown above with a bold white eyebrow, white chin, and buffy-orange underparts. The tail is often sticking up.

Wrens are also cavity nesters but are not choosy. While they will happily use a bird house,

they will also use any kind of hollow space including flowerpots, shoes, drainpipes, and even parked cars.

The red-bellied woodpecker doesn't really have a red belly. It does have a red crown and nape, black-and-white barring on the back and wings, and white underparts. Woodpeckers make their nest in cavities they chisel out deep in dead trees or dead parts of live trees.
